



Discover Paroo

- Sitting on the banks of the Warrego River, Cunnamulla is home to a thriving tourism sector that sees significant seasonal visitors explore the outback. Spa and Spring Tourism - A new hot springs and riverwalk attraction in Cunnamulla, which is expected to incorporate a sun terrace and massage rooms.
- Digital Readiness – Nearly \$2.4m of digital communication infrastructure, bringing reliable high-speed internet to Paroo Shire, right out to some of the furthest communities.
- The Great Artesian Basin provides water security for agriculture, particularly livestock. While \$1.34m recently invested in water bores ensures water access for the residents and small businesses of Eulo, Wyandra and Yowah.
- With recent investment of \$15 million in public infrastructure, including a new civic centre and sewage treatment plant, Paroo is open for business and visitation alike.
- Pristine rivers, potential for irrigation development and diversification into niche crops marks Paroo out as a place of significant agricultural opportunity.
- Paroo Shire is ideal country for wool and meat sheep, cattle and goats. Mulga provides a reliable, drought resistant fodder, while the rapidly expanding network of exclusion fencing increases the possibility of further intensive agriculture.
- At the crossroads of highways linking the channel country and the state capital, and Sydney to Darwin, the shire enjoys excellent transport links. This enables easy access to regional meat exporters at Charleville and cattle sale yards at Roma.
- This is mulga country. High in protein and quick to sprout again after lopping, the acacia plays an important role in maintaining Queensland's cattle breeding herd in good seasons and in drought.
- Marvel at the fire in our stone. Every year buyers for Europe's leading jewellers and tourists beat a path to the opal fields of Yowah and Koroit. Located among a major opal field, the southernmost mining centre in the region, Yowah offers convenient facilities, a permanent water bore and easy access.
- Encompassing the ancient lands of seven Aboriginal tribes, the shire has a rich indigenous history.

Boundless Opportunities for Investment

Agriculture	Significant opportunities to locate and expand livestock operations, with good proximity to supporting services including abattoirs and logistics.
Industrial space	A diverse range of available land, particularly in Cunnamulla.
Logistics	Crossroads location, proximity to NSW border and strategic sites to locate facilities for transport and other facilities such as a biosecurity truck wash.
Small business	Population growth in Cunnamulla brings many opportunities for new small businesses to service increased demand, including tradespeople, veterinary services, and accountants, along with arts, crafts and business start-ups. Premises are available in a choice of prime locations.
Mining	A mature opal mining industry at Yowah and other fields provides opportunities for further exploration.
Housing	There is a strong rental market and demand for a range of housing in the Shire.
Horticulture	Paroo’s fertile soil is suited to many plant species such as table grapes, chick peas, barley and wheat, and presents ideal conditions for organic small crops too.
Tourism	Paroo has a strong foundation of natural beauty, wide open spaces, tourism product, visitation numbers and drawcard events (including the renowned Music in the Mulga). There are opportunities for accommodation development (including higher-end), experience-driven product and events that will catch the imagination and interest of the many visitors to South West Queensland. Rising tourism demand presents an opportunity for investment in short-term accommodation units, such as a motel.

Warrego Riverside Park

Drawn to the untapped potential of an idyllic spot by the water, Warrego Riverside Tourist Park was established by Judy Roberts nearly ten years ago. Covering an area of 32 acres, the park caters for caravanners and campers with 30 powered sites and endless space by the side of the river.

A typical season sees the park welcoming 3,500 vans with many returning year on year. The favoured spot is now a destination in its own right with scores of loyal visitors making it their end point on epic trips from either the east or the west.
